The Charity is governed under the Trust Deed of the Late John Barnes.

The Trustees present their Annual Report and financial statements of the Charity for the year ended 31st December 2019. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Charity's Trust Deed and the Charities Act 2011.

Structure, Governance and Management.

The Barnes Charitable Trust was founded in 1991 on the death of John Barnes, who for many years was the Headmaster of Earnseat School.

The Trustees meet 4 times a year to discuss work needed to ensure the safety and upkeep of the gardens, orchards and woodlands for the general public.

New Trustees are appointed by the existing Trustees. The welcome pack for new Trustees includes a brief history of the Trust, copies of Trustee Board minutes, a copy of the last three years' Annual Reports and accounts, a copy of the governing Trust Deed and a copy of the Charity Commission's guidance 'The Essential Trustee: What You Need to Know' and 'Charities and Public Benefit'.

All Trustees give of their time freely and no Trustee remuneration was paid in the year.

The Trustees have examined the major strategic and operational risks that the Trust could face and confirm that systems have been put in place to ensure that these risks are kept acceptably small.

Objectives and Activities

The Trust was set up with the following objects.

- Such charitable purposes for the general benefit of the inhabitants of the Civil Parish of Arnside and its neighbourhood for which provision is not made from public rates as the Trustees think fit.
- 2. To provide in the interests of social welfare such leisure, recreational and other facilities as the Trustees shall think fit for the use and benefit of the inhabitants of the Civil Parish of Arnside and its neighbourhood.
- 3. To preserve the aesthetic and architectural values of Ashmeadow House, Arnside, Cumbria and the gardens and Parklands belonging thereto for the benefit of the said inhabitants of the Civil Parish of Arnside and its neighbourhood.

As the Trust had no large reserves of money for many years, (it only had a half share of the interest from the bequest made by John Barnes until the death of his wife, Dorothy,) initially it was

decided to focus on preserving the gardens and woodlands for the enjoyment of the general public. Opening the gardens and woodlands to use by all the village would, it was felt, act in accordance with the objects of the Trust and be financially viable. The House was sold by the executors in 2004 so that part of objective 3 does not lie within the remit of the Trust.

Investment Policy and Reserves policy

All the money from the original trust became available in 2015 and the Trustees have formed an investment and reserves policy. We have decided that a sum of £275,000 at Dec 2014 prices, should be kept to produce income for the day to day running of the charity. This sum will be added to in line with inflation so that the charity will at all times have enough money to generate income to further Aim 3 to look after the Ashmeadow woodlands for the enjoyment of all the inhabitants of Arnside and visitors to the area. This is around £310,000 at todays prices. At the present time most of this sum is invested either with the COIF Charities Funds or through a local fund manager Rathbones. A small part will be kept as cash in the Skipton Building Society. The rent from The Lodge, the interest from investments together with the remaining money will be used to enable us to carry out our commitments over the coming years.

Achievements and Performance

People

The Trust's continued thanks are due to Ken Kitchen who kindly remained in the post of temporary honorary secretary for this year. Ken has announced his resignation this year & will be replaced by lan Walsh as full time secretary in January 2020.

Ann Kitchen has also handed in her resignation as treasurer but will remain as a trustee until early in 2020. Ken & Ann Kitchen, have worked extremely hard to ensure that the administration of the Trust is managed effectively and efficiently. Our thanks go to both, they will be missed. Mary Hamilton kindly agreed to take over as treasurer from October 2019.

Unfortunately, Pete McSweeney resigned this year as well. The Trust would like to thank Pete for all the hard work he has put in representing the Trusts interests in many areas over the years. Pete has kindly agreed to be available in an advisory role, should we need him in the future.

The Trust are very pleased to welcome 2 new Trustees, Ian Walsh & John Stride. Both have a good knowledge of the village and the woodlands & bring new vigour & skills to The Trust.

Ashmeadow Woodlands Boundary

The Trust has employed Milne Moser Solicitor's to help with the on going question of Dallam Tower's claim of "Manorial Rights" over the woodlands. They have also been helping define a minor boundary dispute with the owners of the tennis court.

Ashmeadow Woodlands

The Trust continues to maintain Ashmeadow Woodlands to a high standard. Our prime objectives are to provide visitors to the woodland with a safe and enjoyable environment.

We are indebted to the help that we get from our woodland adviser Roger Cartwright, who has announced his retirement from a full time professional role. Roger has also kindly agreed to continue to advise, unofficially, when needed. We have also had considerable support from Helen Rawlinson, the wildlife officer from the AONB & their volunteers. With their help we continue to follow the Woodland Management Plan that sets out how the woodland is going to be managed over the coming years. This plan allows the Trust to have a tree felling license so that urgent work can be carried out on damaged trees without having to apply for permission from South Lakeland District Council.

The contractors that were appointed in 2012 to help manage the woodland are still working to a satisfactory standard.

There was some storm damage caused during 2019. Minor tree surgery was done to ensure the safety of surrounding properties and footpaths. However, the Trust continues to monitor the condition of all trees and take remedial action where required. This is an on-going process. There was some water damage to the paths, which has been repaired & a proposal for future drainage is being developed.

Thanks to the hard work of Christine Youdale, re-positioning & monitoring the bird & bat boxes, we now have more of them being used than ever before. This has considerably help the animal diversity in the woodlands.

The Trust encourages all visitors to the woodlands including responsible dog owners. Most dog owners do behave responsibly and pick up after their dogs, however we would appeal to those who don't, to consider their actions and help to make sure that the woodland is a pleasant place for everyone to visit.

Walled Garden

This year we built 2 new raised plots in the back of the allotments, creating a more practical soil depth in both. We also added a 3rd water butt to try & ensure we don't run out of water in the future.

As part of The Heron Corn Mill's Flax project, we grew & harvested a flax crop in one half of a vacant allotment plot.. The other allotments continue to be a success with all plots now allocated. Thanks to Julia Holroyd who is managing them.

Organised Visits

We did not organise any visits this year. However, we do try to help if we are approached with a specific request.

We welcomed back The Silverdale & Arnside Art & Craft Trail in June to use The Woodlands as an outdoor Arts Trail. This included various sculptures, artwork and a sound installation of unusual sounds recorded by local school children. It proved a continued success with a large number of people visiting The Woodlands.

Orchards

The new trees planted in 2013 are continuing to do well. The grassland management regime also meant that the daffodils have thrived. Pruning has helped the older trees to regain vigour. We have lost another old apple tree & are continuing to monitor the others. I am pleased to say that this year the mistletoe, in the top orchard, has survived the Christmas period with out being butchered. So hopefully it will have a chance to flower this coming year.

Finance

The majority of the Trust's capital has been invested with The Charities Investment Fund (CoIF) and with the financial investment management company, Rathbones. Reasonable returns from these investments are being received by the Trust. The Trust will continue to monitor these investments and makes changes as and when appropriate.

Ashmeadow Lodge

The lodge tenancy is being managed on behalf of the Trust by Hackney & Leigh who charge 10% of the rental fee for this service.

The Trust continues to monitor both the lodge structure and the living accommodation. The Trust's has a legal responsibility to ensure that the lodge fully complies with the latest regulations for rented accommodation.

Barnes Charitable Trust Grant Scheme (BCTGS)

The trustees have agreed that from 2015, the Trust will make small grants (usually between £300 & £1,000) available from the profits of the previous year's investments.

The criteria for a grant are available on the Trust's web site.

Unfortunately, due to insufficient funds, no grants were allocated in 2019. The Trust made its usual donations to The Broadsheet and the Poppy Fund. The Trust is pleased to announce that there will be some funds available for grants in 2020.

Web Site

Book Publication

The Trust has published a book written in 1903 by J Anthony Barnes called "All Round Arnside". The original print run commissioned by the Trust in 2015 has sold out. A new print run was done in 2016, albeit a smaller quantity.

This is available from Bullough's Londis, on The Promenade, Arnside - price £5.

They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities. The Trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the information included on the charity's website. The Trustees have made every effort to ensure that they have complied with these responsibilities.
